The MAFC pooled fund (initially named the Mississippi Valley Freight Coalition) began in 2006 to investigate and support the efficient, reliable, and safe transport of freight and related development opportunities. MAFC pooled fund members are the 10 states of the Mid America Association of State Transportation Officials (MAASTO).

MAFC supports the development of freight-related transportation operations, facilities, and freight-related policy and their linkages with economic and community development.

TPF-5(509) is the 4th phase/iteration of the MAFC pooled fund.

- Begin impact and time for service analysis for 10 selected communities for Emergency Service Access Along
 Class I Rail Routes.
- Present corridor work zone modeling for *Construction Impacts on Multistate Freight and OSOW Corridors* project to technical representatives for review.
- Continue literature review and begin state contacts for, Freight Impacts to Natural Resources and the Environment in State Freight Plans
- Continue TPIMS data warehousing and support of TPIMS.
- Complete MAFC quarterly virtual meeting sessions.
- Continue planning for MAFC annual meeting.

Significant Results:

- Advancing annual meeting planning in collaboration with ITTS.
- Received MAASTO BoD approval for final research projects.

Circumstance affecting project or budget. (Please describe any challenges encountered or anticipated that might affect the completion of the project within the time, scope and fiscal constraints set forth in the agreement, along with recommended solutions to those problems).

 Delayed member state contributions for final year of TPF caused initial contract concern. States have worked with WisDOT to remedy this issue, and currently only 1 state's final year contribution remains to be transferred.

Potential Implementation:

- Private businesses are incorporating TPIMS in their information sources and products.
- MAFC technical meeting sessions continue with all member states participating. The meetings focus on sharing
 of best practices, data resources, and information in support of individual, agency, and regional freight
 development.

- Public ports and private terminals are using the <u>MAFC Port and Terminal Buffer Tool</u> to explore local business opportunities and customers. The Port of Lacrosse and tenants have reported using the application to explore the businesses in the area.
- Public ports are using recent marine and port publications to structure strategic port development plans. MAFC
 personnel met with the Mayor of Lacrosse, County Administration, and the MPO to discuss strategic port
 development.
