- Complete MAFC quarterly virtual meeting sessions.
- Prepare contracting for remaining 2022 2023 agenda projects.
- Initiate development of the 2023 2026 research agenda for MAFC Phase 4.

## Significant Results:

- The Marine Planning and Electrification projects have created engaged stakeholders and champions.
- The Marine Planning project working session was well attended by technical specialists. They provided the needed feedback and ideas to complete the project.
- The technical representatives from the 10 MAASTO states selected the joint Ohio/Kentucky Conference on Freight as the venue for the 2023 MAFC Annual meeting. Participants from the SASHTO and MAASTO states will also hold their annual meetings at this event providing for a large peer to peer event.

- MAFC Technical and Annual meeting sessions continue with all member states participating. The meetings
  focus on sharing of best practices, data resources, and information in support of individual, agency, and
  regional freight development.
- Expand collaborative efforts with other freight sectors. Use recommendations from the report, Characteristics
  and Importance of Freight Aviation in the MAASTO Region, and Collaborative Freight Planning and Economic
  Development: Maximizing State Marine Freight Planning as a basis to engage freight aviation and marine
  professionals.
