Project Description:

History: The Mississippi Valley Freight Coalition was renamed the Mid-America Freight Coalition in 2010.

The goal of this pooled fund is to improve the efficiency of freight movements in the region through inter-jurisdictional cooperation. Through the Mid-America Freight Coalition, the states will work cooperatively in the planning, operation, preservation, and improvement of the freight transportation system infrastructure and engage the public and private sectors in the processes for improving the efficiency of these freight transportation systems.

This Member Service contract entails the services provided to Members of the Coalition which includes coordinating and funding an annual meeting; communication efforts: Web site and newsletter production; and teleconferences/webinars. This contract also provides the administrative support for all MAFC projects.

MAFC Freight Plan Alignment

The MAASTO Executive Board Unanimously approved an additional three year extension for MAFC at the August 2015 MAASTO meeting in Kansas City Missouri.

Progress this Quarter (includes meetings, work plan status, contract status, significant progress, etc.):

In the first quarter of 2015, Dr Perry finalized the planning for a two year work program with the MAASTO planning committee following outreach to the state freight technical representatives. The process resulted in identification of 4 projects as follows, one of which has been completed and two are additional projects underway. The projects and estim start and deliver dates are as follows.

Significant work has been completed in this quarter for member services as well as the MAFC Freight Plan alignment Study. For the Freight Plan alignment effort, freight plans and planning efforts for all 10 states have been reviewed and analyzed. State freight planners have been interviewed about their planning efforts and the project effort was reviewed and discussed at the annual meeting in Cincinnati. As part of implementation for this project, I organized a webinar based on Iowa DOTs planning work to share best practices across the states. I anticipate another project meeting with state technical representatives in early 2016 to finalize data collection. Another major success in the last quarter was the MAFC annual meeting held in conjunction with the Ohio Conference of freight. With close to 300 people in attendance at this event, all 10 of the states were able to attend and benefit from the presentations and networking. It was truly a great meeting with sessions on marine freight development, economic development, workforce issues, freight planning and others. And with an active policy environment in Washington, I have also undertaken reviews of the National Freight plan and multimodal network as well as the freight components of the Reauthorization bill –FAST - passed just last week,

At the request of Indiana DOT, a review J – turns and their impact to trucks and permitted vehicle was conducted. The draft document was delivered to Indiana DOT in late June and final edits are now underway. Upon the finalization of editing, the competed document will be shared with all states and posted on the MAFC web.

On June 18, Dr Perry attended and participated in the MnDOT Freight Planning committee meeting to review the progress and approach for the MnDOT freight Plan.

Dr Perry is working with TMACOG and OKI planning groups as well as Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky for the MAFC fall conference planning. State registrations and tour sign-ups are complete.

Dr Perry and staff currently are focusing on the MAFC freight planning alignment study. State freight plans, freight and modal websites and planning guidance have been reviewed, and interviews with state freight technical contacts has begun. This is a promising project and from our initial interviews there will be tremendous opportunity to share information and strategies across the MAASTO states.

Dr Perry is also preparing for the Aug 8-10, 2016 MAASTO meeting in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Anticipated work next quarter:

Work will continue on the freight plan alignment effort, as well as on the new national freight planning direction and the freight components of reauthorization with the FAST act.

Will continue to update web with relevant materials and plan for another teleconference and best practoces webinar with the starepresentatives.

Continue updating web site with relevant content.

Beginning planning for 2016 MAFC Annual Meeting.

Successful annual meeting in collaboration with Ohio TMACOG, and the states of Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky.

Reviewed all freight planning active in 10 states and completed interviews.

States awarded 25 million Tiger grant for Truck parking implementation.

Finalized Truck Parking Management Synthesis. MAASTO submitted Tiger application for regional system.

Completed literature review on I-turns for Indiana DOT

Attended MnDOT Freight Planning meeting.

Seventy-five percent complete on planning and arrangements for September MAFC annual meeting.
